The Wellington monument is 53.34 meter triangular obelisk in the Blackdown Hills. It is 3 Km south of Wellington. It is a Grade 2 listed building and was designed to commemorate The Duke of Wellington's victory at The Battle of Waterloo.

The Duke of Wellington



Arthur Wellesley, 1st Duke of Wellington, was an Anglo-Irish soldier who was one of the leading military and political figures of 19th-century Britain, serving twice as prime minister of the United Kingdom. He fought in the Battle of Waterloo. The town of Wellington was settled by British settlers in 1839 and named after Arthur Wellesley, the first Duke of Wellington and victor of the Battle of Waterloo.
